2020 has been filled with recognitions and awards for Fisher-Titus, including:

- First WavelinQ Fistula Creation in Northwest Ohio – The WavelinQ procedure created a fistula used for dialysis endovascularly (a minimally invasive procedure providing access for kidney dialysis).

In 2021, the Fisher-Titus Foundation will support three major projects that will invest in Quality, Safety, Access and Affordability in services for our community into the future.

Modernization of a Cardiac Cath Lab Providing excellent heart and vascular care locally is important for our residents given the prevalence of heart and vascular disease and emergencies. The Snyder/White Heart and Vascular Center at the Fisher-Titus Medical Center will be renovating and replacing a cardiac catheterization laboratory as well as a new cardiac monitoring system for Cardiac and Pulmonary Rehab in 2021. The present Cardiac Cath Lab was designed before Level II designation and before many of today's procedures were being performed here. The new Cardiac Cath Lab will be upgraded with an entire suite of state-ofthe-art technology to support the next 10 years of excellence in cardiovascular care in the community by investing in:

- Integrated HD technology and equipment, critical to bring all high resolution images of arteries and veins together on one large HD screen during procedures, and to integrate with all equipment.
- A ceiling mounted "C arm" and operating table that integrates with all technology and equipment.
- Advanced technology and diagnostic tools with lower radiation doses to patients and healthcare workers.
- Redesign of the Cath Lab to perform both cardiac and vascular procedures,



and to support the skill level of today's Fisher-Titus Cardiovascular Team.

North Central EMS Ambulance Replacement

Reliable, life-saving emergency medical services for our community is vital to our health and safety. With a service area spanning roughly 530 square miles, North Central EMS provides care to over 60,000 people with stations located in Norwalk, Milan, Berlin Heights, Greenwich, Bellevue, Green Springs, and Monroeville. Because they serve a larger geographic area with a lower population density, North Central EMS operates at a financial loss that is subsidized by Fisher-Titus, and supported by the municipalities served and by donations to the Fisher-Titus Foundation.

Approximately 8 to 9 ambulances are on the road at any time. Each North Central EMS ambulance runs up to 600 miles per day. The average service life for an ambulance is 350,000-400,000 miles. North Central EMS controls maintenance costs and extends the life of its ambulances by servicing them in-house. The combined total mileage for the current ambulance fleet is over 2.4 million miles, with an average of 186,000 miles on each ambulance.

Senior Campus

Fisher-Titus is imagining the future of senior care, building on a strong tradition of exceptional care for area seniors at Norwalk Memorial Home--beginning in the 1950s at 269 West Main Street then at 272 Benedict Avenue since 1985. Limitations to the Norwalk Memorial Home's current facility have been limiting the services we can provide to our community at a time when a significant portion of our population is aging. As

demographics, geriatric medicine, and the needs and expectations of our seniors have evolved, Fisher-Titus is recommitting to provide our community with access to the latest in senior health care while remaining close to their loved ones in our community. With the senior campus project, we are looking to improve efficiencies; improve safety for residents, visitors, and staff; improve access to services not currently available at the Norwalk Memorial Home; and prepare for the future needs of the community for decades to come. Our vision includes:

- Memory care;
- On-site dialysis;
- Hospice care within the facility;
- · Improved dining experience;
- Improved bathroom accessibility;
- Additional private rooms;
- A more residential feel;
- Improved views, natural lighting and outdoor spaces;
- More resident space; and
- A location adjacent to The Carriage House for loved ones requiring different levels of care.
